I & E Committee Tour

On March 26th & 27th, 2024, The Little Blue NRD hosted the Nebraska Association of Resources Districts (NARD) quarterly Information & Education (I & E) Meeting in Hastings, NE. On March 26th, The I & E staff participated in a Project Water Education Today training workshop with Jack Hilgert from Nebraska Forest Service. After the training, I &E staff went for a tour of City of Hastings Water Treatment Plant, Ensign Beverage, and Lake Hastings.

On March 27th, the I&E staff gathered at the Heartland Bank to discuss statewide educational and outreach programs. Directors Tour District Projects

On Tuesday, March 19th, 2024, the LBNRD hosted a Board of Directors Tour. The tour featured six sites in Jefferson, Fillmore, and Thayer Counties where directors visited several recreation areas and toured future sites of rural water project development.

The tour sites included: Buckley Creek Recreation Area, Bruning Dam Recreation Area, Gladstone Water Tower, Glenn Wellfield, Kujath Pump Station, and Lone Star Recreation Area.

The purpose of the tour was to show the directors projects and programs in the Little Blue NRD in order to assist them in making sound decisions when these items are presented during board meetings. Seeing these projects and programs in person allows the directors to gain a fuller grasp and understanding of the projects and their challenges. NOTICE TO IRRIGATORS

Little Blue NRD staff will be collecting water samples from irrigation wells M - F 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. from April 15th to October 15th. This effort is part of the NRDs mission to maintain an adequate supply of acceptable quality groundwater to forever fulfill the reasonable groundwater demands within the Little Blue NRD.

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Trigger Level Rules

In the Winter 2023/2024 newsletter it was noted that 2023 fall static water levels were below the trigger levels in both Hydrogeologic Units 1 and 2 (See map), which if water levels remained below the trigger level in Spring of 2024, a stay on well drilling would be enacted. Any action of stays or groundwater allocations are based on spring levels, not the fall measurements. 2024 spring water level collections will begin on April 3rd, with a report to the board being given during the May 14th meeting.

Little Blue NRD's rules state that immediately upon the first year's announcement that the allocation trigger for a Hydrogeologic Unit has been met the Board shall impose an immediate stay on the construction of all high-capacity wells and prohibit the expansion of irrigated acres. The rules state that

the stay will be in effect indefinitely unless the Board takes action to lift it. The Board may, however, allow construction of a permitted well to continue for wells which construction hasn't been completed before the implementation of the stay if substantial completion has begun prior to the announcement of the stay.



Allocations of irrigation water go into effect only if the trigger level is hit for a second consecutive Spring. This means that the absolute earliest an allocation could go into effect is Spring of 2025.

If you're in a position where development for irrigation has begun for the 2024 irrigation season, please note the dates mentioned. Keep handy any relevant information such as well drilling dates, cost expenditures, pre-paid bills, etc. that would document substantial completion regarding that development.

Current Stays in the Little Blue

The colored areas shown on the map below are known as Unit 8, Aquifer < 10 feet, and The Platte River Special Management Area. All three areas have been under stays since the dates listed in the legend on the map.

A stay means to halt, stop, or delay a well permit, action of development, or the expansion of irrigated acres.



Unit 8, (Red Area, a subunit of Hydrogeologic Unit 2) is the portion of the paleovalley where high-capacity well permits, the expansion of new irrigated acres and groundwater transfers are prohibited. The stratigraphic boundaries for this stay area are from

the land surface through the underlying water bearing silts, clays, sands, and gravels, and include the sandstones, siltstones, chalk, and shale formations which may contain groundwater below the Unit.

Lands identified as Aquifer < 10 feet(Yellow Area) is where high-capacity well permits are prohibited, however, the expansion of irrigated acres is allowed in this area. The stratigraphic boundaries for the stay area are from the land surface through the underlying water bearing silts, clays, sands, and gravels, and include the sandstones, siltstones, chalk, and shale formations which may contain groundwater below



the Unit.

The portion of the Platte River Drainage, seen in detail above, is an area in Northwest Adams County where groundwater uses have been determined by Nebraska Department of Natural Resources modeling to impact Platte River stream flow by 10 percent in 50 years is known as the Platte River Special Man-

agement Area. This area is part of the Platte River Recovery Implementation Plan (PRRIP) which was developed by the federal government along with basin states of Nebraska, Colorado, and Wyoming and was signed in 2006. The purpose of the PRRIP is to enhance, restore, and protect habitat lands and flows for the endangered Whooping Crane, Piping Plover, and Pallid Sturgeon, and the threatened Interior Least Tern. The PRRIP calls for plans to mit-

igate, offset, or prevent any new depletions to the Platte River flows from the Program area. To meet the PRRIP's objectives, there is a stay on the issuance of new high-capacity water well construction permits and on any new and expanded use of groundwater within the Program area.

Farming For The Blue River

The Farming for the Blue River project is a partnership between the Little Blue Natural Resources District (NRD), Lower Big Blue NRD, the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), and the Nature Conservancy.

The goal of this project is to co-learn with farmers to develop nutrient management plans to reduce nitrogen losses and improve nitrogen use efficiency.

Project partners will work with farmers to create a nutrient management plan in line with the plant's nitrogen needs, provide farmers technical assistance in adopting precision nutrient management, and participation in a peer-to-peer learning network to scale practices regionally.

Farmers can enroll up to 160 acres per year, up to three years, and will receive \$10/acre per year for each acre enrolled in the program. Additional financial assistance is available for annual soil sampling throughout the timeline of the project to inform the revised nutrient management plan. Additionally, the Farming for the Blue River partners encourage farmers to layer additional cost-share incentives by enrolling in the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) with NRCS.

Chemigation

The State of Nebraska gives each NRD the task of collecting payments and inspecting and reporting chemigation permits. By state law, a chemigation permit MUST be obtained before any person can legally chemigate.

New Permits: New chemigation permits cost \$60.00 per injection site. Permits should be paid prior to or at the time of inspection.

Renewing Permits: Renewal cost is \$20.00 per injection site. Renewed permits must be received by June 1, along with payment. Any permits not renewed before June 1 will be considered a new permit.

Inspections: Chemigation systems for new permits MUST be inspected and approved by the Little Blue NRD staff before initial use. Systems already inspected with a renewal permit, are on three year rotation for inspections.

Heitmann Dam Cost Share Project

Construction of a dam on property owned by Heitmann Farms, Inc., located 5 miles west of Chester, Nebraska, began in February and is currently nearing completion. CES Engineering from Marysville, Kansas was hired to design a structure to control runoff from a 50-year storm event involving 513 drainage acres. Lottman Excavating from Beatrice, Nebraska was hired to build the 16,000 cubic yard earth fill structure at a cost of \$125,000. When complete and filled, this structure will create a 20-acre pond holding 91 acrefeet of permanent water storage. Funding from the NRD's Small Dam Cost-Share Program contributed \$50,000 towards this project.
